NEEDS ASSESSMENT

This course is designed for otolaryngologists, speech language pathologists, and paramedical personnel who wish to further their understanding of the advanced diagnostic and treatment options for individuals with swallowing and voice disorders. Participants will be presented with a thorough understanding of the biomechanics of normal swallowing function. Swallowing diagnostics will be discussed in detail including fluoroscopy, endoscopy, and manometry. In addition, participants will gain knowledge of the state-of-the art treatments for swallowing disorders, both with dysphagia therapy and surgery. Participants will also gain knowledge in the diagnosis and treatment of benign laryngeal lesions and neurologic conditions. Participants will learn the medical, behavioral, and surgical approaches (including office-based treatments) of laryngeal/vocal disorders.
